Northern Lights Learning Trust is a thriving multi-academy trust that educates over 3,000 pupils from the age of 2-16 across Wearside and Teesside.

At Northern Lights, we are passionate about making a difference every day and believe that children should be active, confident, independent and resilient learners who are inspired by their environment and the curriculum we offer. We want them to aim high, achieve great things and embrace future challenges with the confidence to step out of their comfort zones. We are a Trust where children's individual talents and dreams are nurtured and celebrated by all.

Our DfE accredited Northern Lights
Teaching School Hub plays a significant
role in Initial Teacher Training, the Early
Career Framework, National Professional
Qualifications (including the NPQ
Early Years Leadership), support for
new Headteachers, Appropriate Body
services and provision for high-quality,
evidence-based continuous professional
development and training for teachers
and leaders. Working currently with over
300 schools across the region, we feel well
placed in supporting schools in a world
where education is changing so rapidly.

Throughout the pandemic, the youngest children in the most disadvantaged areas of England were among the hardest hit by lockdowns and social distancing. A responsive programme of support for staff and children has been developed by the Government to assist recovery and address the disruption of Covid-19 through the DfE Recovery Programme.

What is the DfE EY Covid Recovery Programme?

The programme is funded through the £153m Early Years Covid Recovery package that the Government announced to address the impact of the pandemic on the youngest children, focusing on those most disadvantaged.

The Stronger Practice Programme includes the Online Child Development Training, a free child development training for all EY practitioners; the Experts and Mentors Programme providing in-setting support to the workforce; and the Stronger Practice Hubs, all underpinned by the EYFS reforms.

What is an Early Years Stronger Practice Hub?

'A strong provider of pre-reception early years education with sound expertise and knowledge of the evidence base on what works to support child outcomes - trusted local experts that other early years providers can look to for advice and support'

The DfE overarching aim for the hub is:

'To help pre-reception early years settings adopt evidence-based practice improvements to address key Covid recovery issues, and build trusted networks for sharing effective practice'

We aim to do this by:

- Providing high quality professional development to practitioners to improve outcomes for pupils in disadvantaged areas and our young and vulnerable children who have been impacted by Covid
- Creating networks of support across the sector to provide evidence informed practice to improve outcomes for children
- Working with LAs and the expert and mentors programme to identify settings to support with bespoke support, advice and sharing best practice.

The role of DfE, NCB and the EEF in the SPH

hubs an evidence-based Framework on what works to support child outcomes, to underpin the work of the Hubs, and support hubs to translate evidence into practice

- National Children's Bureau as Delivery Partner will lead the relationships with the Hubs, providing oversight and quality assurance. Also facilitate best practice and intelligence sharing between the Hubs
- The Department for Education work closely with NCB and EEF to ensure the government vision for Hubs is met.

What is the Northern Lights SPH vision?

Our vision is to work with the whole Early Years sector with children from birth to pre reception and practitioners from childminders, the PVI sector, maintained nursery schools and early years settings within primary schools. This will unite the workforce to create a successful Stronger Practice Hub which will support our young, vulnerable and disadvantaged children as we recover from the impact of Covid-19. Our SHP will provide a 'buzz' of regular activity within the sector as we work towards uniting the workforce to overcome current challenges through

engaging and responsive social media, online learning portals and face-to-face events. We will work in collaboration. with our SPH partners and associates to provide high quality professional development that is based upon local intelligence and is responsive to the needs of the communities we serve. We will proactively share best practice examples of evidenced informed practice which will support practitioners to improve outcomes for our children. Through the delivery of our EEF programmes, we will educate the Early Years workforce by providing quality professional development which is aimed at supporting children's learning and development in the areas that have been significantly impacted by Covid.

Our Programmes



Early Talk Boost is a targeted intervention aimed at 3-4 year old children with delayed language helping to boost their language skills to narrow the gap between them and their peers.

The programme aims to accelerate children's progress in language and communication by an average of six months, after a nine week intervention.

Children who are selected to take part in the intervention will attend three sessions per week during circle/story time, each lasting 15-20 minutes delivered by an early years practitioner.

The sessions include activities that cover the foundation skills in speech, language and communication that children need for learning and understanding new words, as well as having conversations.

Communication Friendly Settings



Elklan Communication Friendly Setting (CFSe) accreditation is awarded to settings that have trained and support all their staff in communication and language development.

Accreditation can be achieved in one year and can be renewed after three years. It is the most cost-effective strategy available for whole-setting capacity building in communication.

Becoming a CFSe involves three steps:

- 1. 1 in 10 practitioners complete Elklan's 'Speech and Language Support for 3-5s' and/or 'Speech and Language Support for 0-3s' course at Level 3.
- 2. At least one of these practitioners, cascades training to ALL staff in your setting using our course 'Communication Counts'. They are known as Lead Communication Practitioners (LCPs). We provide the teaching notes, mentoring and resources to facilitate this and support LCPs to achieve Level 4 accreditation.
- 3. Embedding of the training will be demonstrated through an audit at the end of the programme, evidencing the impact on practices and policies within the setting.

Communication Friendly Home Based Settings

Elklan's Communication Friendly Home-Based Setting (CFHBS) award examines all aspects of the Home-Based Setting, including the physical environment (inside and out), interaction styles, how language is modelled and the opportunities and resources that are provided to support the development of language, communication and learning.

The process aims to enable those caring for children in their own home to consider the opportunities, resources and personal interactions provided and to reflect on areas for development, with guidance from an Elklan tutor. The childminder or foster carer is given a manual full of ideas and strategies to promote language, communication and learning in the home and help to gain the award.



WORKING ALONGSIDE TINY TWEETIES

We are so excited to be working with Rachael and Chris from Tiny Tweeties.

The interactive, joyful sessions for all early years practitioners explore how music, movement and singing can positively impact early communication, language, personal, social and emotional development.

Rachael and Chris provide an intriguing insight into the theory behind their sessions and demonstrate how music can help to provide the building blocks for future learning in this critical time of brain development.

EVIDENCE-BASED APPROACH PROVES THIS IS THE WAY TO GO

As part of DfE's recovery package and the remit of our Early Years hub, we support early years settings to improve outcomes for children, but specifically focusing on areas of development that research informs us have been most impacted by COVID-19.

A vehicle for doing this is sharing information and advice on evidencebased approaches. We held our first showcase event at Benedict Biscop Academy, with a focus on developing vocabulary. The session was based upon the strong evidence base around teaching and modelling vocabulary to children in the early years and the positive effect this can have on their oral language skills. The showcase brought the evidence to life for the 40 practitioners who attended!

Examples of our amazing feedback:

"We're going to look at the use of the tiered language model to support and promote language specific to children's stage of development."

"A combination of explicit and implicit teaching strategies is key to developing children's vocabulary skills."

"The importance of a language rich environment, the tiered approach to language development and we've gained some great ideas regarding provision."

"We are now going to go back and look into this approach to develop staff interactions!"

APPLICATIONS NOW OPEN!

DID YOU KNOW: 60% of practitioners expressed an interest in completing a **National Professional Qualification for** Early Years Leadership while it is fully funded.

As part of the DfE's wider Covid Recovery Programme, Early Years, all practitioners working in a nursery setting are invited to undertake a DfE accredited professional qualification in Early Years Leadership, fully funded.

Who is it for?

Leaders and aspiring leaders who hold a full and relevant level 3 early years qualification who lead a private, voluntary or independent nursery, are head teachers or leaders of a school-based or maintained nursery, childminders with leadership responsibilities, or other early years foundation stage leaders, such as reception class teachers or early years coordinators.

What does it involve?

A comprehensive programme, strengthening leadership skills and supporting effective curriculum design to enhance child development. It also trains leaders to support children impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. Participants will cover the following seven areas: culture, additional needs and SEND, organisational management, working in partnership, child development, curriculum and assessment, professional development and implementation.

How is it accessed?

Northern Lights Teaching School Hub is a Delivery Partner, in partnership with Ambition Institute and the model we offer includes:

- Two live conferences (six hours long each - facilitated by our experts)
- Nine (six week) courses of self-study completed at a time that suits you around one hour per week.
- Six two-hour online clinics (facilitated by our experts)
- One two-hour assessment clinic (facilitated by our experts)
- Nine online community sessions (peer led sessions).

As a local delivery partner, we will use Ambition Institute's high-quality content and materials and put the knowledge into context of the region, managing your experience on the programme through facilitation and day-to-day support.
